The Order of Meditation and Prayer

Invocation: In the Name of the Father and of the † Son and of the Holy Ghost. **Amen.**

Apostles' Creed

Verse (Learn by heart) Therefore by the deeds of the law no flesh will be justified in His sight, for by the law is the knowledge of sin. – Romans 3:20

Psalm 119:1-8: Read this Psalm **out loud** each day and/or one of the Psalms from the **Daily list:** 90; 146; 27; 91; 136; 119:105-112; 42

Catechism (Learn by Heart): The 10th Commandment and Conclusion

What is the 10th Commandment?

You shall not covet your neighbors wife, nor his manservant, nor his maidservant, nor his cattle, nor anything that is his.

Pre +

What does this mean?

We should fear and love God, so that we do not tempt, force, or coax away from our neighbor his wife or his workers, but urge them to stay and do their duty.

2nd +

What does God say about these commandments?

I, the Lord your God, am a jealous God, visiting the iniquity of the fathers upon the children to the third and fourth generations of those who hate Me, but showing mercy to thousands of those who love Me and keep My commandments. (Exodus 20:5-6)

Lection: Micah 6:6-8; Philippians 1:3-11

† **St. Matthew 18:21-35** To “love mercy, and to walk humbly with your God” (Micah 6:6-8) is what the Lord says is good. It is a description of faith in Christ. The parable of the Unjust Servant (Matthew 18:21-35) teaches us that in the death of His Son, God has forgiven us a debt that we could not pay. To walk humbly with your God is to trust in the death of Christ by confessing one's sin and clinging to His forgiveness. To love mercy is to believe in Jesus' forgiveness as the most important gift we have from God through Christ. Forgiveness for those who have trespassed against us flows from our faith in Christ's undeserved forgiveness. To refuse to forgive those who trespass against us is a denial of faith in Christ and a rejection of His forgiveness. God forgives us freely by the merits of Jesus alone, that we might live in that free gift of forgiveness especially toward those who have sinned against us. This is “fellowship in the Gospel” (Philippians 1:3-11). It is the life of mercy and unconditional love that covers the sins of others with forgiveness freely and unbegrudgingly given.
